1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Government College Meham was established in 1981 and was taken over by the Haryana Government on 20 October 1987. It is located in District Rohtak of Haryana. The Government College Meham is a premier college in the area known for excellence in educational standards, various educational programs, grand faculty, rich cultural extracurricular activities, and modern infrastructure. The Government College Meham is affiliated with Maharshi Dayanand University Rohtak. The College supports the highest superior standards and best practices in higher education to develop all round personality of the students.

History:-

The people of Meham and nearby villages faced problems regarding higher education for their wards. A committee of five members was constituted to collect the funds and raise the donations for building up the project. A renowned businessman named Lala-ji Jeevan Ram donated a huge amount of four lakh Indian rupees at that time. Further, the local folk of Kishangarh, Meham, and other villages came together and started a charitable college under the able guidance of ex-MLA SHRI. HARSWAROOP BOORA and the first principal Shri. R.C. Punia had taken the college to new heights. Later on with span of time the institute was taken over by the HARYANA GOVERNMENT on 20TH October 1987.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The Government College, Meham is located in the historical town known as Meham. Our college is the third largest college in Rohtak district having permanent affiliation with Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak.
- The institute has a huge area of 25.3 acr. There are around 200 trees and ample plantations. The college campus is well-maintained and flourishing with lush green lawns.
- The college has been 100% ragging-free for the last decade.
- The students are enrolled from nearby villages. Our institute has earned a high reputation among female students. The college campus is 24/7 under CCTV surveillance. The Women Cell is always on its toes for the upliftment and betterment of female students.
- Our Institutional Distinctiveness is reflected in our students excelling in Sports and achieving Gold and silver medals at the National, State, and University levels.
- The focus of college revolves around inculcating discipline, knowledge, leadership, and punctuality through Teaching learning pedagogy and lays strong emphasis on the all-around development of students through extracurricular & and co-curricular activities. Our students have extended a helping hand by participating in a number of Outreach Extension Activities through our NCC, NSS, YRC, and RRC units and received many appreciation awards for the same. The college has adopted three villages and NCC and NSS made regular visits to old age homes during the pandemic.
- The college has strong Infrastructure in terms of Building, Library, IT and Sports facilities. The college has well-equipped laboratories, a reading room, a sports ground, an auditorium, a conference room, smart rooms etc. The teaching faculty is well-qualified, and proficient in relevant subjects. A large number of staff members are PhD holders.
- Eco-friendly campus with segregation of waste, 4 rainwater harvesting systems, and e-waste management collection and is a Recognized Swachhta Action Plan Institution by MHRD, Govt. of India.

- Conduct frequent Quality audits, AAA, Energy and Green audits.
- Skill development initiatives by Add-on / value-added certificate programs and Collaborations, MOUs with other educational institutions for better placement of our students.
- Our list of alumni includes Associate and Assistant professors, Artists in Bollywood and Hollywood with many alumni settled overseas.

Institutional Weakness

- Every institute has its own strengths and weaknesses depending upon the geographical dimensions and other factors.
- Most students prefer coaching classes for competitive examinations along with regular classes.
- There is only one Honors program (Mathematics) at U.G level. There are no courses for Post Graduation.
- The college has a scarcity of funds and grants due to which research facilities are lagging behind.
- Paucity of teaching and non-teaching staff. In departments that have single teachers, when the teacher needs to attend a training program/ refresher course or proceed on study leave, there is a crisis for the students. This sometimes compels the teachers to delay their own career plans.

Institutional Opportunity

- National Education Policy 2020 focuses on holistic growth and development. The institute will strive for more Honors programs and PG courses.
- The college is in the process of augmenting its existing infrastructure. The laboratories, library, and smart classrooms will be upgraded in the future.
- The current curriculum is not skill-oriented. Our dependence on the affiliating university will hopefully be reduced after the complete implementation of the NEP, which will give us scope to be more innovative in planning/choosing our courses.
- Opportunities have increased for students to participate in community outreach programs in the college.
- The proposed Incubation Centre can be fruitful in enhancing the research and skill environment in the college.
- More interaction with the market can be established by inviting industry representatives to play a more active role in planning the skill components for the students.

• The institute will sign more MOUs and collaborate with companies for campus placement.

Institutional Challenge

- Most of students hail from rural and lower mid-class families, so they need extra nurturing and care compared to their peers.
- The early marriage of female students is a strong challenge because of societal pressure.
- The paucity of funds and grants.
- The college is affiliated with MDU so amendment in the curriculum is a challenging procedure.
- Procedural difficulty in keeping track of students qualifying for State / National /international-level examinations.
- Improving Student-Teacher Ratio

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- Govt. College Meham is a constituent college of Maharshi Dayanand University and the academic programmes are implemented as prescribed by the University. However, the college innovates within these established academic structures in a variety of novel ways committed to provide holistic development for all its students.
- Planning of academic and co-curricular activities is done by IQAC in the beginning of the year by
 preparing Academic Calendar streamlining the academic processes with timetables, lesson plans,
 workloads, and other administrative tasks prepared well in advance of teaching sessions. Teachers take
 utmost care to complete the syllabus in time. PO, PSO, COs, Timetable and Lesson plans are posted on
 the college website and Notice boards.
- Various programs like Orientation program, Mentor- Mentee classes, Parents Teacher Meets, Extension lectures, workshops, seminars, extension activities, field visits and Intra and inter departmental competitions are organized to enhance critical thinking and for overall growth and development of students. College offers number of certificate and value-added courses.
- Continuous Internal Evaluation of students is done through internal examinations, assignments, presentations, projects, seminars and group discussions etc.
- To promote community engagement, gender sensitivity, ethical conduct, and social and environmental

responsibility, different teaching departments ,subject-specific clubs and societies , NSS, NCC, YRC units organise activities such as special lectures, observance of days, events, seminars, intra-college competitions and drives.

- Our teachers regularly update their disciplinary knowledge through active involvement in faculty development programs, curriculum reviews, evaluation, invigilation, and participating in various decision making bodies of the university.
- Feedback system at Govt. College Meham is transparent and accountable. Feedback is taken on forms created by feedback committee every year. The data is complied, analyzed, and shared with the concerned individuals for prompt actions. The channels for communication with different stakeholders are kept warm responding to diverse needs. The IQAC conducts annual report and all departments are encouraged to undertake self -assessment to critically reflect on their practices. This approach supports the amalgamation of the interests of the stakeholders as well as institute. The department of higher education has recently introduced a state level web-interface for online feedback collection.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- Teaching, Learning and Evaluation plays very critical role for the blooming of an institution. Our
 college believes in theoretical as well as practical learning to enhance the student's learning skills and
 innovative ideas.
- Admission process is online and administered by the department of higher education at state level. College follows the reservation policy of the state government and constitutes an Admission Committee for fair and transparent admissions. The academic year starts with an extensive induction programme to orient the students.
- Our College has 50 teaching faculties comprising NET-qualified, M.Phil. and Doctors of philosophy in various disciplines. The teachers takes great interest in solving the questions of the students, employing various strategies and pedagogical techniques and skills. Students are nurtured by teachers to improve critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving attitude.
- Overall teaching-learning process is made student centric by holding discussion sessions, appropriately integrating ICT tools, presentations, projects, class tests, lectures/interaction with eminent experts, fieldwork methods, online classes and seminars. Collaborative learning is fostered through activities like producing the college magazine, participating in inter-departmental competitions, attending conferences, and engaging in cultural, sports and co-curricular events. Students are encouraged to participate in activities like science quiz and exhibition at different levels to showcase their innovative ideas and enhance their scientific temper. Steps are taken to improve both advanced and academically weak learners. Value added courses are offered with Industry collaboration to gain knowledge on industry.
- Mechanism of internal & external assessments is transparent and guidelines issued by the affiliating university in this regard are followed in true letter and spirit.

- POs and COs are displayed on college website which clearly describe the basic and advanced knowledge content of the subject, the skill sets that can be acquired in practicing the knowledge gained in the program. Students are assessed at regular interval for the attainment of POs and COs through exams, attendance records, practical exams and feedback.
- College Grievance Redressal Policy and Mechanism is published on college website and student grievances are redressed with highest priority level in a time-bound and efficient manner.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- Govt. College Meham, Rohtak is thriving for excellence in research and offering ample opportunities for co- and extra-curricular activities to students. Faculty members of the College are actively engaged in research activities. Several Research papers in UGC CARE and Books/Chapters/Papers were published by the faculty members during the assessment period.
- Faculties are encouraged to participate in various conferences/ Seminars/ symposia/ workshops etc. and training programs are conducted regularly by the departments.
- The research culture among the students is mostly confined to their curriculum and guidance is extended to the students to be actively involved in the application of Technology for societal needs.
- Science exhibitions, working models, and prototype building based on theoretical concepts ensure the application of the text to practice. Our students made a robot hand which can be operated from a distant place, which has many applications in the industry
- Govt. College Meham has a primary vision to facilitate a platform for a budding entrepreneur to start a business venture with minimum risks. The College has signed MoUs with various academic institutes and organizations helping students and teachers to inculcate entrepreneurship skill.
- Government College Meham undertakes various extension activities in the neighbourhood community through its various units like NCC, NSS, YRC, RRC, different Clubs, Societies and Departments and have been appreciated and numerous awards have been given to us as acknowledement of our services to the society.
- Various Cells of the college tries to imbibe different values in students and employees through its activities like Slogan Writing, Essay Writing, Poetic Recitations, Skit, Quiz, Speech/Declamations, Debate, PowerPoint Presentations and Documentary etc.
- Our college has been declared as a Recognized Swachhta Action Plan Institution by MHRD, Govt. of India to inculcate the practices of Swachhta, Reuse, Reduce and Recycle in faculty, students and community.
- Our students made a short film and a documentary to spread awareness about AIDS and pollution .NSS and NCC students visit villages and teach them about their fundamental rights, help them to develop social harmony and to overcome various addictions caused by alcohol, tobacco, etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- Government College Meham has acquired a prominent reputation for its Qualitative Education and Infrastructure. The campus has a total area of 25.3 acres and the total constructed area is 6272 square meters. The whole campus is covered with remarkable greenery and is under the surveillance of CCTV.
- Campus of the college is well equipped with the facility of wi-fi. The college has selected FTTH plan. Additionally, college has upgraded the internet Leased line of 2 MBPS bandwidth to 50 MBPS. There are 88 computers and 15 printers, which have been allocated to various departments and 76 dedicated servers for smooth functioning of computer labs and language lab.
- There are four independent teaching blocks. There is one auditorium cum multipurpose hall with good audio- visual facility in the college with seating capacity of 1000 students at a time. There are 25 classrooms, 11 laboratories, 09 Faculty rooms, 02 Common rooms for girls, 02 ITC-enabled classrooms, well equipped Seminar Hall and rooms for Women Cell, Placement & Career Guidance Cell, National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps, Cultural Room, SC Cell, NAAC/IQAC, and Grievances Redressal cell.
- The College Library is fully automated (in the year 2009) using integrated library management system (ILMS) using SOUL software 3.0 version. For e-resources, Library has taken the annual membership of N-LIST, ShodhGanga and E-books via NDLI. Using N-LIST users can access 194685+ e-books and 6293 e-journals. There are 20,756 books in library and all are automated as well as has one reading hall for students with the capacity of 100 students at a time.
- The infrastructure of the College is differently-abled friendly with washrooms, parking, ramps, signage for differently abled students.
- To develop students' physical strength and endurance, college has a large sports ground with 400meter Track, Basket Ball and Badminton Courts, Cricket Pitch, Yoga area and Volleyball, Football, and Kabbadi Grounds.
- College is connected to the Hotline and 6 Kva generator set has been installed in the college in case of interruption in the power supply.
- Vita booth in the college campus maintains the hygiene and offers food at subsidized rates.

Student Support and Progression

Govt. College, Meham has various student support systems like-

Scholarships- It is a very effective support system to afford education for students with poor financial conditions. College has near about 7 scholarship schemes that are disbursed by government agencies. Some scholarships/stipend schemes are based on castes and some are on merit basis. During the last five years near about 7000 plus have been students benefited by scholarships/stipend.

Capacity Development and skills enhancement activities-To develop hidden talents and to inculcate the skills among students, various activities and workshops like on skills development, language and communication skills and activities related with life skills which includes Self-defence training, Yoga training, Meditation and Nutrition Gyan workshop, Lectures on legal rights and crime against women, CPR demo, First Aid training etc. were organized.

Guidance for competitive examinations and career counseling- During the last five years college had

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organized various workshops related to career counseling, career in army personnel, interview preparation etc. through which various students had benefited in their career. College has formed tutorial groups to impart one-to-one personalized career counselling to the students.

Grievances Redressal- Govt. College, Meham has various cell/committees like Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell and ICC with their transparent and obstruction-free mechanism to solve student's grievances. To maintain discipline in college campus, cctv cameras are also installed at various places.

Awards/Medals/participation in sports/cultural events- During the last five years, college students had participated in nearly 130 events and our students secured 11 awards/medals for their outstanding performance at State and National level.

Student Progression: In the past five years, many of our students have been placed and progressed to higher education have cleared reputed examinations like NET, CTET, Civil Services etc. The data doesn't reflect the true potential due to limited records.

Alumni Engagement- College is proud of its alumnus. Institution has registered Alumni Cell to reach out to former students for Institutional and Academic development of the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Vision and Mission of the institution are translated into action through an effective governance. The strategic plans are framed keeping in mind the vision and mission of the college and feedback generated from stakeholders

- The organogram on the college website elucidates the administrative set-up of the college. Being a government institution, policies and rules of DHE Haryana and the Government of Haryana are followed. The Principal, IQAC, College Council, Bursar, Head of departments and the conveners of various committees and cells, along with the staff representatives play a significant role in determining the policies and create strategies for academic and developmental activities.
- Aimed at achieving academic excellence, the Institution helps its teaching staff grow professionally by
 encouraging them to take part in Academic events, Training programs, Refresher courses, Orientation
 programs, Faculty development programs, Seminars, Workshops and Conferences.
- The service of the teachers is governed by Haryana Education (college cadre) Group 'B' service rules 1986 as amended from time to time. Institution follows structured performance appraisal system. All staff members are entitled to perks such as Pensions, Health cards, Gratuities, Leave benefits, Wage adjustments, Insurance, Children allowance, Wi-Fi facility, Health camps, Clean and safe workplace, Accommodation and Sports facilities. Teachers are to fill ACR annually and achieve a minimum API Score in order to be promoted.
- Institute has set procedures for mobilization of funds and its optimal utilization.
- The DHE sets the college's budget, which is then distributed by the Principal to other committees and departments for the purchase of supplies, equipment, and other necessities.

• The college has a well-organized IQAC under chairmanship of Principal which plays a key role in taking decisions regarding the development of the college including Infrastructure and Academic development. IQAC is involved in preparing Institutional Perspective Plan which is effectively deployed. Regular meetings are held to propose and consider qualitative measures. College participates in various quality measures and audits like AISHE, NIRF, PRAYAAS.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

- Government College Meham works to develop students into enlightened citizens of the nation by
 providing them with an education based on values. Institute understands the importance of gender
 equity and provides equal opportunities and exposure to female students. Several facilities like CCTV
 Cameras, PCR, Girls Common Rooms, Girls only studying area in library and events related to gender
 sensitization provide a conducive environment and ensure proper safety and security of girl students.
- College underlines the importance of sustainable development through various initiatives like replacing conventional lights by LEDs, constructing water harvesting system, waste management through initiatives like segregation at source and separate pits for biodegradable waste. To assess the above initiatives Green and Energy audit was conducted. Our college has been declared as a Recognized Swachhta Action Plan Institution by MHRD, Govt. of India.
- To ensure an inclusive environment, various committees like SC Cell, ICC, Women Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell etc. have been formed. Campus is disabled friendly. Legal literacy cell promotes constitutional obligations and organizes several extension lectures to sensitize students and employees
- Additionally, College has two Best Practices; Community Outreach and Extension Services and Imparting Values Through Co- Curricular Activities with the objective based on preparing students for the future while bearing respect for cultural heritage and traditional knowledge, innovative learning approaches, and commitment to human values. NSS, NCC, YRC, numerous College Clubs and Committees conduct various extension activities in the neighbourhood community and contribute to social cohesion covering Health-Related, Environment Conservation, Social Awareness and Advocacy and Disaster management etc. reinforcing the values that have been imparted in the classroom Our efforts have been appreciated and numerous awards have been given to us as acknowledement of our services to the society.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Govt. College Meham is affiliated to Maharshi Dayanand University and implement all the directions of the university. Most of the programmes offered by the College are multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary programmes like every student in B.A. has to choose two languages including English and Hindi/ Sanskrit and have to choose two optional subjects among different disciplines in Arts stream. B.Sc. Students under Non-Medical Group has two multidisciplinary options to choose from (Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics) and (Physics, Computer Science, Mathematics). In addition to this student of all programs study about the computers, environment, gender, and professional

ethics. As per the guidelines of NEP the college is prepared to enrich its teaching-learning process by incorporating Multi-disciplinary / Interdisciplinary aspects. To develop all round capabilities of students our college has conducted conferences, seminars, and workshops to provide diverse, flexible, and innovative teaching-learning. The College offers Skill enhancement courses, Value added courses and Ability enhancement courses to develop the all-round capacities of the students i.e., intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional and moral in an integrated manner. Another aspect that highlights the College's multidisciplinary approach is by focusing on outreach activities in the neighborhood. The hybrid mode of teaching opens up infinite possibilities of collaboration with other institutions and faculty for exchange of services and expertise. This will give us flexibility to add newer courses that are truly interdisciplinary in nature.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is an important part of NEP 2020 which seeks to promote flexibility of curriculum and provide academic mobility with appropriate credit transfer mechanism on the principle of multiple entry-exit making students mandatory to have ABC IDs. It will enable students to open their accounts and give multiple options for entering and leaving colleges or universities. There will be "multiple exits" and "multiple entries" points during the higher education tenure and credits will be transferred through the ABC seamlessly. Regarding the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits, the institution is working hard on the latest instructions received from our affiliated university and the Department of Higher Education, Haryana. Our college shall abide by the curriculum and structure prepared by the affiliating university in this regard. Our college will set up dedicated committees for the assessment, tracking, and management of student records in ABC strictly as per Principal Secretary Higher Education, Haryana letter no. Cord. SPL/01/2022 dated 02.11.2022). Academic Bank of Credits as mandated by Maharshi Dayanand University, Rohtak Our Institution is prepared to implement ABC. For this purpose, a centralized database in accordance with college data is being established. Academic credits earned from various courses will be taken for the

purpose to implement ABC, and technical support is created. College-wise awareness has been created through messages on groups and ABC Ids are being generated and information will be sent to the University in Excel format.

3. Skill development:

The Skill Enhancement Courses are aimed at developing skills amongst students. Our college is inclined to skill development in co-curricular activities along with the regular course. The college is offering several opportunities to the students under the aegis of IQAC for skill development as witnessed by a number of workshops and training programs organized on the topics like Geoinformatics, Drone technology, Defense training, Yoga and Meditation, Cooking skills, Beautification and Wellness, Folk dance etc. These additional skill courses will help the students to start their entrepreneurship after leaving the college. College has functional MOUs which will help them to find better jobs after completing graduation. Some of the Courses being taught by us orient students in values and soft skills like gender and environmental sensitivity. The department of Geography teaches 'Remote Sensing', 'Geographic Information System (GIS)' and 'Field Survey Techniques'. The department of Chemistry trained students on testing of soil samples. Computer Labs for IT Skills and Language lab allow inculcation of vocational skills in the curriculum. Compulsory Computer Education will help students develop digital skills that are essential in the modern workplace. It is ensured to develop basic digital scheme in every enrolled student. Co-curricular activities undertaken as part of the NSS, NCC and other such cells give ample opportunity to students to develop socially useful skills like teamwork, leadership, social service, communal harmony and interpersonal relationship management. College also offers apprenticeship to various ITI students under NAPS Act. Adopting the vision of NEP and following the curriculum of the parent university, we hope to introduce many add-on courses in the next session to groom our students in a manner that they are equipped with the necessary life skills for mentally, physically and financially satisfying lives.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

The curricula of our various UG programs have a focus on IKS, including traditional knowledge systems, indigenous practices, and Indian philosophy.

Exposure to Indian Knowledge systems is inherent in many of our courses and activities. The content in the curriculum of disciplines like Sanskrit, Hindi and English Literature, History, Cultural geography, Economics and Mathematics appropriately integrates Indian Knowledge System of thought, literature, arts, family and social structures, economy and politics. Trips to historical places are organized to embrace the study of India's past, to help ensure that students are knowledgeable of the culture in which they live and create a more inclusive learning environment for all Integrating Indian knowledge systems. Activities that showcase cultural traditions like Zonal youth fest, festival celebration like Teez, Diwali, Holi are frequent and regular feature in the life of students on the campus. Students are encouraged to practice Yoga by organizing workshops on Fit India, Meditation and Peace of mind to educate them about the benefits of its practice. Extension lecture on Astrology was organized by Sanskrit department to familiarize students with our traditional systems. The college magazine has articles both in Hindi as well as in English. Celebration of Hindi Diwas and other National days foster a greater understanding amongst students about the legacy of our past and needs of the contemporary society.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The syllabus along with the Program and Course outcomes are shared online and updated on college website to facilitate accessibility to various stakeholders including the teachers and students. Whole academic activity is planned in accordance with them. The focus of our institution is to measure education not only in quantitative terms but also qualitatively. The Program & courses offered are in accordance with the Vision & Mission of the Institution. Attainment of Outcomes is measured on the basis of various mechanisms like analysis of results of university exams, Feedback from all stakeholders and analysis of students' progression etc. College imparts outcome-based education through various Skill Enhancement and Value-Added Courses which aim at providing life skills as well as technical and professional skills to students for their holistic education. College works towards all round development of students including Physical & Health. Students are encouraged to participate in different cocurricular activities. Our college has

adopted student-centric teaching methods and provides students with access to a variety of resources that range from audio-visual materials to classroom simulations. IT resources are used to achieve specific outcomes to explore Job opportunities & have more placements to ensure that the educational experience offered by our college is more holistic and effective and that the learning outcomes are being met.

6. Distance education/online education:

Distance Education at Govt. College Meham was started in session 2019-2020. Under this mode every year nearly 700-800 students who are working in various fields and seek to attain higher qualifications took admission and got benefited from this blended mode of education. Every year there is a significant increase in the figure of the students getting education in this mode. Government College, Meham is working hard to promote this type of teachinglearning mode taking into account NEP. Each year eight to ten staff members have been engaged in this mode. There are eight classes for each subject in every semester. The students can interact with their mentors and ask any query. The classes are properly recorded by Google Meet. College adopted modern technologies for online education during the COVID-19 pandemic also. LMS (Learning Management System), Shiksha Setu App were used for administration, tracking, attendance, assignment etc and took classes on Google Meet, Google Classroom, Zoom etc. Content has been prepared by faculty members and uploaded on website to help the students learn through online mode and to meet future challenges Blended form of teaching and learning is still going on. The library has an Online Public Access System (OPAC) and is Wi-Fi enabled. Using N-LIST users can access 194685+ e-books and 6293 e-journals remotely using login id and password. In addition, the library has membership of British Council of India which enable with eresources.

- IQAC in consultation with Principal formulate our college's Academic Calendar in concurrence with the academic calendar of Maharshi Dayanand University and College academic plans. It includes all the curricular and co-curricular activities to be done throughout the year.
- Orientation program for fresh students are organized to familiarize them with the facilities, disburse the syllabus and elaborate the internal assessment process.
- The information and details about POs and COs are displayed on college website and the hard copies are displayed on departmental notice boards as well.
- At the beginning of each academic session centralized time table is framed by time table committee. All the teaching staff members prepare their lesson plan for each class before the commencement of each semester. Teacher wise timetable and lesson plans are posted on college website, notice boards and on classroom walls.
- The identification of students' learning challenges and specific needs is accomplished through the
 use of tutorials, continuous internal assessment and mentor-mentee interactions. Internal
 Assessment is being carried out adhering to the university guidelines i.e., through regular
 attendance, presentations, class tests, assignments and viva -voce. Grievance if any, is addressed
 immediately.
- The college organizes PTMs to make a rapport between teacher and students.

- The library offers offline and online study material on every subject. E-resources and the college library are regularly updated with new books/journals/periodicals.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

Govt. College Meham follows the curriculum as decided by the affiliating university M.D.U. Rohtak. The curriculum imparts not only extensive learning of the subject but also incorporates necessary elements to make it synchronous with societal needs. Different papers of the syllabus cater to relevant issues and help in preparing students for the challenges before us.

Professional Ethics:

Issues related to professional ethics are the integral part of different courses taught in the institution. Clinical Psychology and Psychological testing teach the students about ethical behavior to be observed while dealing with clients. Business Ethics and Organizational behavior provide information about professional ethics in Commerce stream. Seminars, conferences, science exhibition, field excursions and different activities of Placement Cell are just some of the other ways which students are exposed to professional ethics. CCE certification course is provided to students of all streams designed to foster

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digital literacy.

Human Values:

Several papers are introduced in the syllabus to inculcate moral values in the students. Language and literature of Hindi, English and Sanskrit aims at inculcating human values in readers. Preachings of Bhakti and Sufi saints are introduced in papers of History. The cross cutting issues that are relevant for social stability and growth are the integral part of the curriculum related to different social science courses run in the college. NCC, NSS, YRC, Legal Literacy Cell, Mentor-Mentee sessions and Cultural Cell organize a variety of events like Human Rights Day, Blood donation camps, health checkup camps and various other activities like extension lectures delivered by professionals, educationists, spiritual gurus etc. promote a sense of cooperation, human values, and moral principles among students.

Gender:

English, Hindi and Sanskrit subjects are dedicated to contribution of women in Literature and problems faced by women in society. Papers like Psychology of Social Issues and "Gender studies" etc. across a range of subjects help students become more gender sensitive. Gender related societal issues like female foeticide, dowry, domestic violence, women empowerment through political participation etc. are the part of the curriculum of Political Science in under-graduate classes. Women Cell, Legal Literacy Cell, YRC, NSS and NCC units of the college organize various activities related to gender sanitization, human equality and feminine rights throughout the year.

Environment:

The Environment Studies is taught as the compulsory paper for the first year students of undergraduate classes. Through regular classes and practical assignments, the students are sensitized about environmental issues. They are made aware that sustainable development is must to conserve resources and to help our future generations to survive. Geography illuminates the students about man-environment relationship, pollution, conservation of resources, flora and fauna and different disasters. Every year, institute also celebrate Environment Day and organise many campaigns to keep the community clean. Throughout the academic year, Geography department and NSS put in a lot of effort to organise many events. Esteemed faculty members aware and engage the students about various environmental projects like soil sampling, and field projects.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

In order to promote experiential and participative learning teachers in the college use traditional pedagogy alongside more experiential methods such as group exercises, brain storming group debates relating the curriculum to real-world experiences for the purpose of making the teaching and learning process more effective. Students are encouraged to become active participants in the learning process rather than merely passive observers through the organisation of special lectures, seminars, and conferences.

Experiential Learning:

Practical skills are enriched by conducting practicals and Language lab to enhance the student's communication skills .Faculties make use of audio visuals aids, charts, departmental wall magazines for learning experience. Virtual learning through seminars, group activities, projects, videos to enhance academic delivery. Volunteering with clubs and societies along college units of NSS, NCC the students learn essential life skills, leadership qualities and professional skills by experiencing challenges. Skill Enhancement Courses such as Geoinformatics , Dance , cosmetic and Soft Skills are instrumental in gaining experiential learning.

Participative methods:

College uses Participative Learning to encourage students to actively involve them in learning process. Teachers uses different methods for participative learning like Group Discussions, Assignments, Workshops, Quizzes, Projects, Presentations etc. Students are encouraged to participate in various cultural & social activities like youth festival, legal literacy programmes, NCC, NSS etc. Active involvement of students is ensured through seminars, webinars, problem solving activities like group discussion, alumni meet and lectures, quiz, PPT presentations, participative e-learning lectures, poster making competition. Students write articles in Magazine and participate in Talent Hunt competition, Youth fest and Intercollegiate competitions.

Problem solving methodologies:

The students are guided by teachers to work on different projects which attributes to improve their critical thinking, creativity and problem solving skills. They undertake project works on various issues related to Commerce, Science, Geography and Surveys. Class tests, Open book tests, MCQ tests and Surprise tests are conducted to improve problem solving skills. Live problem solving, case study, debates, group discussions etc provide a practical experience to the students. Teachers maintain a list of slow learners and peer groups are formed where the advanced learners help their peers. In tutorial sessions, teachers specifically engage with the difficulties being faced by the students. The students participate in various co-curricular activities in parallel with teaching learning process. These include Youth festival, Educational tours, NCC camps, NSS camps, Legal literacy activities, Women cell functions, Industrial Visits and various departmental activities.

ICT tools for effective teaching and learning process:

College has ICT enabled classrooms and labs with LCD projectors installed and campus is enabled with high-speed Wi-Fi connection. Teachers created online study material and uploaded on College's website alongwith use of Google/Microsoft Teams classrooms for online teaching. Through library students and teachers have access to thousands of books and journals through INFLIBNET N-LIST. Google forms are used to conduct online examinations and feedback . PowerPoint presentations are used for lecture

delivery.

In order to ensure transparency in internal assessment, presentation and attendance of students, the system of internal assessment is communicated with the students well in time. During the Orientation session and introductory classes, students are informed about the Academic Policy of the College. Principal conducts meetings of the faculties and directs them to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation process. The schedule for class tests and submission of assignments is announced among the students well in advance.

Students are encouraged to prepare different topics related to the syllabus for the presentation. Students are well informed in advance that independent learning, original thinking and new ideas will be given additional points. A variety of techniques and methods such as MCQs, Quiz, Group Discussion and Classroom presentations are employed on a continuous basis before semester-end examinations held by the University. Those students who have been regularly absent for 14 consecutive days are struck off by the respective departments and the students are informed of this through the college notice board. Assignments and tests are regularly conducted and students are given more than one opportunity to

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improve their competence and performance.

Grievance Redressal system is time bound and efficient. The College employs an efficient system to ensure transparency to deal with grievances of the students related to Internal/External Examination and framed the Grievance Policy for the same. The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment tests are displayed on the department notice board.

Students can discuss the query with the faculty members and HOD's and see the records of attendance in attendance register, test and presentations. The details of Examination forms in the form of RR/CR are circulated among the students through Whats App groups and College Web Portal for verification and rectification of errors before its finalisation. The errors reported by students are corrected immediately

The Practical examinations are conducted in the time frame provided by the University. The External examiners are appointed from the Panel List provided by the University as far as possible. Immediate action has been taken by the College for resolution of common problems e.g. nonreceipt of Roll Number slip, Withholding of results, Question paper related issues, Correction in Name, Father's name and DOB etc. in mark sheets/degree.

The External examinations are conducted in a transparent manner. If the students indulge in any kind of malpractice, severe action has been taken after discussing the matter with the Chief Superintendent of Examination Centre.

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

Academic Programme outcomes and Course outcomes help every Institution to accomplish its Mission and Vision. Programme outcomes are those statements which represent the student knowledge, skill, confidence, attitude and ethical values. Course Outcome is the final result achieved by a student by learning a particular course. Government College, Meham follows the guidelines and norms of the Maharshi Dayanand University with respect to offered programmes and course curriculum/syllabus. There is a transparent mechanism for communicating POs and COs to learners and faculties in the college.

The information and details about POs and COs are displayed on college website and the hard copies are

displayed on departmental notice boards as well. This enables the learners to select a specific programme by studying the details of the program. The COs expressed clearly describe the basic and advanced knowledge content of the subject, the skill sets that can be acquired in practicing the knowledge gained in the program.

In the beginning of the session the information and details on POs and COs are also disseminated during the orientation programmes organized for first year students and parents teachers meeting. Immediately after the Orientation Program, teachers apprise the students about POs and COs over the next few days. The respective faculties of each department interacts with the students and explains in detail the importance of each programme, course and its outcome. They also discuss the career prospects available to the students in their respective programmes. Based on this, the freshers take a decision on whether to continue with the chosen subjects or opt for a change.

The syllabus along with the Course Outcome is available in the respective departments for ready reference for the faculties and learners. Teachers often address concerns and questions from students about the course's final consequences.

Lesson Plans are prepared by the teaching faculty and displayed on Website and put up hard copies of the plans on noticeboards in the student common areas.

Subsequently, the class activities have been adapted by the faculty members to reflect and achieve the COs and overarching POs in letter and spirit. Co-curricular activities are planned by departmental, subject society and club/cellwise to ensure adherence to POs and COs. The college also deputes teachers for workshops, seminars, conferences and FDPs to enrich them to attain the outcomes which helps the faculities in their teaching learning classes. Tutorial sheets, assignments, question papers, internal assessment of assignments, lab reports, sessional tests, projects, are designed in such a way that it blooms students competence. Participation in such exercises helps in self-evaluation by teachers and also to customize their lesson into students individual needs.

Programme outcomes and Course outcomes are evaluated according to the track of students's performance and improvements in student's ability and skills throughout the academic year, in both

curricular and co-curricular activities. Various formal and informal mechanisms are available for assessing the attainment of POs and COs:

- Tests: Course Outcome attainment levels are set for all courses and based on internal assessment and semester end term examination. Students knowledge, ability, competence, problem solving ability and understanding about topics area evaluated by class tests time to time.
- Assignments: To examine the skill, knowledge and ability of the students, assignments are given to students related to subject area.
- Classrooms Discussions: Classrooms discussion, presentations and MCQs are conducted from time to time.
- Seminars: To access the scopes of the programmes and courses, extensions lectures and seminars are organized by the college. The assessment of professionals who interact with the students during placement drives, field visits, and invited lectures is also sought
- Project and Field work: Theoretical knowledge is not enough for overall development of students. Thus, practicals of Chemistry, Physics, Psychology, projects on planning, data interpretation and analysis of results, field work are given to them timely to induce the spirit of scientific enquiry and to provides a direct evaluation of the practical skills and knowledge acquired.
- Attendance: The attendance-cum-record registers maintained for each course by the faculty have dedicated columns for attendance, results of mid-term exams, and in-class assessments.
- Competitions and Extra Curricular Activities: Subject societies and clubs conducts interdepartmental activities like Poster making competitions, Declamation, Slogan Writing, Debates, Quiz, Essay writing Competitions etc. Awards and Certificates are also given to students for encouraging them.
- Mentor- Mentor Mentee groups are also made for counseling of the students about weaknesses, career scope etc.
- Feedback: Suggestion from alumni, students and staff members are collected and implemented by the college.

Evidence of attainment of these outcomes can be seen in our Institutional Distinctiveness in Sports where our students have won medals at National and State level and at various inter-college Youth Festivals organized by MDU and also many prizes in inter college activities like Poster making competitions, Declamation, Slogan Writing, Debates, Quiz, Essay writing Competitions etc. Our students and staff members have received appreciation certificates for their contribution through outreach extension activities. Our college results which are always positive and students achieving ranks in university result. Also, attainment of course outcomes can be seen in progression of our students to higher studies. Many of our students enroll in higher education programme every year and even got admission in Ph.D. programms. Several students of B.Com., B.C.A. have found placement through placement drives. Response:

Government College Meham has acquired a prominent reputation for its Qualitative Education and Infrastructure. There are five bachelor degree courses with eighteen different subjects, which enhance the learning ability of students.

- College Campus: This college is in the historical place of Meham city. The campus has a total area of 25.3 acres and the total constructed area is 6272 square meters. The whole campus is covered with remarkable greenery and is under the surveillance of CCTV.
- **Teaching Blocks**: There are four independent teaching blocks named as Old building, Arts block, Commerce block, Science block.
- **Differently-abled friendly Campus**: The infrastructure of this campus is friendly with differently abled students/ persons. The college has washrooms, separate parking, ramps, signage for differently abled students.
- **Auditorium:** There is one auditorium cum multipurpose hall with good audio- visual facility in the college that provides arrangement for functions and rehearsal of cultural & literary events with seating capacity of 1000 students at a time.
- **Library**: The college library is fully automated with SOUL 3.0 Software and has a collection of around 22,000 books. There is a separate section for newspaper, magazines, reading hall and information center with wi-fi facility.
- Classroom: There are 25 classrooms which are well ventilated and spacious having enough number of dual desk and facility of white and green board. There are two smart classrooms with projector.
- Laboratory: There are 11 laboratories with good infrastructure that cater to practical need of students.
- Academic Support Facility: The college has a total of 09 Faculty rooms. There are 02 Common

rooms for girls. The college has well equipped Seminar hall with large projector screen enabled with wi-fi and has seating for 50 participants.Rooms for Women Cell, Placement & Career Guidance Cell, National Service Scheme, National Cadet Corps, Alumni room,Cultural Room, SC Cell, NAAC/IQAC, and Grievances Redressal cell.

- **Sports Facilities**: There is a large sports ground in the college with 400meter Track, Standardized Basket Ball Court, 2 Indoor Badminton Courts , Cricket Pitch, Yoga area Basketball, Volleyball, Football, and Kabbadi Grounds.
- **Power Backup**: College is connected to the Hotline and 6 Kva generator set has been installed in the college in case of interruption in the power supply.
- **Vita Booth:** Vita booth in the college campus maintains the hygiene and regulations as per govt. guidelines.
- New Infrastructure Proposal: A proposal has been made for new Smart classrooms with advance technology.
- Administrative Support: Office facilitates operations, provides service to students & faculties. There is a Principal office with attached meeting and retiring room, Clerical office in which cabins are constructed. One separate office for dealing of Account clerk, Registrar, and Superintendent clerk.
- **Residential Facilities:** The campus has a double storeyed Principal residence with few residences for class IV employees.
- **ICT Facilities:** There are fully air conditioned two Computer labs and one Language lab with 76 computer systems. For Learning Management System, faculties utilize Google Classroom. Campus is technology-enabled with 50Mbps, 24/7 Wi-Fi and internet connectivity.

Response:

- The Library is the focal point of knowledge and it helps in promoting a productive learning and research atmosphere in college. Library has tremendous resources of books, journals, magazines, and e- resources. College campus has a block named as Library & information Centre which cover 323 square meter area. The library is fully automated with the Integrated Library Management System (ILMS). It has an Online Public Access System (OPAC) and is Wi-Fi enabled.
- The college library is fully automated (in the year 2009) using integrated library management system (ILMS) using SOUL software 3.0 version. With the help of ILMS library has started automated functions like issue and return of books, renewal of books, update the record of books which are purchased during the year, barcode labelling, stock verification and maintain all the records.
- For the purpose of e-resources, Library has taken the annual membership of N-LIST, ShodhGanga and E-books via NDLI. Using N-LIST users can access 194685+ e-books and 6293 e-journals remotely using login id and password. In addition, the library has membership of British Council of India which enable with e-resources.
- Library has spent 5,04,848 rupees in last five years to purchase the 1,906 books and 15,75,603 on other facilities and equipment's.
- There are 20,756 books in library and all are automated as well as has one reading hall for students with the capacity of 100 students at a time.
- There is a fully airconditioned Faculty Reading Hall and Information Centre enabled with the

- facility of wi-fi and can access all type of e- resources.
- The library has well equipped Seminar Hall with large projector screen enabled with wi-fi and has seating for 50 participants.
- Average 100 users have been using the library per day.
- Library has newspaper stands, magazines stand, catalogue stands, catalogue box and other equipment's also.
- College library provides access to all reference collection including Encyclopaedia, Yearbooks, dictionaries, Atlas, Biographies, Competition books and reports etc. All these reference books are for consultation only.

- The BSNL department has established a local internet hub on the college campus, and all connections to the internet in the college are connected to that hub. There are one router and fifteen manageable switches.
- The college provides wired and wireless internet access points in all campus buildings, allowing students, teachers, and staff to take advantage of the internet's numerous services.
- The college has upgraded the internet Leased line of 2 MBPS bandwidth to 50 MBPS for uninterrupted and easier access to the Internet.
- Email with unlimited space
- Google work space
- Several lectures and online study material prepared by the faculty members have been uploaded on the College's website.
- Both the Administration and Accounts sections are automated. Departments have their own workstations with printing facilities.
- The college is equipped with 02 ICT-enabled classrooms that also include internet connectivity, LCD projectors, and interactive whiteboards.
- The college is equipped with a completely air-conditioned seminar / conference hall, has large screen projectors that are internet-connected, and 50 seating capacity.
- The college has well-equipped computer labs. In total there are 88 computers and 15 Printers, which have been allocated to various departments and 76 dedicated servers for the smooth functioning of computer labs and language labs. Cctv cameras are installed in the campus for safety.
- During COVID period, LMS (Learning Management System), Shiksha Setu App were used for administration, tracking, attendance, assignment etc and took classes on Google Meet, Google Classroom, Zoom etc.
- The faculty members are using the IT-Enabled Learning tools such as PPT, Video Clippings, and Online Sources for the exposure of students.

- 2. The Geography Department uses GIS software.

- 4. The Physics Department uses FORTRAN software for enhancing the practical knowledge of the students.
- 5. Library of the college is using SOUL software for recording of books, issuing and returning of books.

The Ministry of Education has initiated various programmes and schemes for faculties and students like "Swayam Prabha", "E- Pathshala" and to promote self-learning among students "UDAAN" is launched which delivers online lectures by motivational speakers. The "Study @Home" facility enables students to get the online study material just by clicking on the TV screen. The DGHE has initiated the "Drishtikon," a digital magazine and has devised a DRISHTI program (Digital Revolution in Information Studies in Haryana for Transformation and Innovation) to boost digital and E-learning in all colleges.

The organization adheres to the accounting standards and laws established by the government of Haryana .The Haryana Government and RUSA provide financial support for the college.Teachers in charge and the conveners of the various committees offer their demands. Following the requirements, an estimated proposal budget is prepared in accordance with the general financial norms established by the government of Haryana and sent to the Competent Authority for approval. They ensure that the labs, library, computing facilities, classrooms, and other equipment and facilities are continuously maintained and improved during the submission of the requirement.

The Principal, the Bursar, and the accounting department process all financial documentation and bills in a transparent manner.

Audit (internal and external)

The college adheres to the procedures and laws of accounting established by the Government of Haryana.

Internal Audit:

The college has designated a Financial Officer, or "Bursar," who verifies and confirms all transactional vouchers in accordance with the approved budget and the availability of college money. He monitors the integrity of financial accounts and offers advice to the Principal on keeping financial records. The internal financial officer-cum-auditor, Bursar, regularly checks to make sure that all financial transactions are authorized and compliant with the law. The formed Purchase Committee and Infrastructure Committee are in charge of all purchases, while the Accounts Department provides the appropriate paperwork and responses to enquiries. The usage of government e-marketing (GeM) speeds up, enhances transparency, and reduce the cost of purchase of items. The Stock Verification Committee examines and verifies the available stock at the end of each financial year. Further, the committee recommends an auction of stock items if found non-operational. The cash book is prepared regularly by the office staff and verified by the Bursar and attested by the Principal.

External Audit:

As per government standards, external audits are performed every 2 or 3 years. The financial records of the state government are periodically examined by the audit team of the Accountant General of Haryana. Higher Education Department Panchkula Haryana, also audits each financial document. The balance sheets and revenue and expenses for the general fund are carefully examined. There are two different kinds of financial resources: first, government funding from the Haryana Department of Higher Education, and second, money collected from students in the form of tuition and other fees. A usage certificate is also supplied following the financial audit, which covers funding for the Placement Cell, Women Cell, Earn While You Learn program, lab upgrade, office costs (O/E), conferences, seminars,

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and workshops.

Transparency in financial transactions

The spending invoices for all Government Grants are filed to the Treasury, and the funds are transmitted via RTGS/NEFT to the vendor's bank account. Students tuition fee is deposited in government accounts via challans. Pre approval of the Principal and the Bursar needed for issuance of Salaries and payments bill after they got cleared from government treasuries .
